For somebody, the verb qoh, to be in a place, is used, as, qoh xbano, somebody did it, i. e.: There is (who) did it. The termination ion, means alone, and is used with the possessive pronouns which precede consonants, it being a curious rule which holds good throughout this language that two initial vowels have the phonetic force of a consonant; thus: nuion, I alone. kaion, we alone. aion, thou alone. yton, you alone. ruion, he alone. quiion, they alone. The negative nobody maybe formed from hun, manihun, no...



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
